#### **Greetings from the Congregational and Official Board Chair**

Earlier this year at our Annual Congregational Meeting, it was truly an honour when you installed me as your Congregational and Official Board Chair. Your Official Board, which is made up of committee members from Session, Property, Finance, Ministry and Personnel, Christian Education, Mission and Service, our Secretary, Presbytery representative, representative from the Trustees and our Minister has worked hard this year to maintain, enhance and improve our church. It has been an exciting year so far as the Board has dealt with a number of important issues and initiatives. This newsletter is being offered as a means of keeping the congregation informed on what is happening at St. Davids-Queenston United Church.

This year the Board has approved and overseen a number of capital projects that were long overdue and made possible by the generous, heart-felt bequest of life-long congregation member Leone Ostrosser who passed away in 2009. Leone's bequest was \$88,101.67. To date, \$82,414.01 has been spent or committed. You can see a detailed breakdown in the Property and Finance Committee Reports. In addition to managing these major church renovations, the Board has been busy overseeing and coordinating the work of all the committees. We are working closely with the Trustees to establish a Capital Reserve Fund from the restricted non-operating GICs that resulted from the sale of the Manse a number of years ago. This will allow us to have ready access to capital funds for future infrastructure renewal projects. The Board has also made a number of grant requests to the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario, Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund and Niagara-on-the-Lake Hydro through the Save on Energy Program for the replacement of interior lighting with energy efficient lights.

I'd like to leave you with an idea for a new fellowship group in our church. Currently we have a wonderful United Church Women's group and a fledgling Women's Craft Group that meet on a regular basis. Our church does not have a similar group for men. I am suggesting we explore the possibility of establishing a **Men's Group** where the men of the church would have the opportunity to meet on a regular basis in a casual, social atmosphere for fellowship, companionship and enjoyment. If there is interest and you are willing to take the lead and organize a Men's Group, please see Steve Hardaker.

# **Presbytery**

For those of you who may not be aware, Fred Van Nest indicated that he would like to be relieved of his position as Presbytery Representative early in the year. After my transfer from another church I was in a position to take over from Fred so he could accomplish this goal.

Presbytery is comprised of all Ministry personnel and all Lay Representatives from the Churches in the Niagara area, that is, from Ft Erie to a bit beyond Dunnville, across to Beamsville and back down to NOTL. This totals approximately 160 people. However, not all of them show up for each meeting. Anyone is welcome to attend meetings which are held from September to June on the fourth Tuesday of the month, except for December and June when the dates are changed to accommodate Christmas and the election of the new Chairperson of Presbytery. Presbytery also has a number of committees which deal with everything from Property issues to Spiritual matters; from interpreting the rules of the Manual to promoting the fund raising efforts of Cave Springs Camp and the Brock U Winter Coat Drive.

At the June meeting Rev Don Glennie of St John's – Stevensville was elected as the new Chair of Presbytery. The Vice – Chair is now Ken Pettigrew from the Resource Centre.

As there are no meetings during the summer months and this report has a deadline, there is not much that can be added at this time.

#### **Fundraising**

Your Fundraising Committee is on a mission to find special needs at our church and work at filling them. The committee is responsible for coordinating all fundraising activities for our church. Special speakers and other special activities are in the works.

The money raised in 2011 through the fundraising committee was \$9,452.50. So far in 2012,, we have raised \$6,597.75. If anyone has idea they would like to share as a fundraising project or social event, we would love to hear about them. This year's special fundraising project will be announced by the end of October.

#### **Property Committee**

Your Property Committee is responsible for maintaining the church building and property and making recommendations for Official Board approval when funding is required for repairs, capital replacement of infrastructure and for new projects. Members of the Property Committee are Tim Andrews, Jack Cecckin, Steve Hardaker, Monty Slingerland, Greg Smith and Don Slingerland.

2012 has been a busy time for church infrastructure renewal. Thanks to a generous beguest from lifetime congregation member Leone Ostrosser, who passed away in 2009, the Board approved a number of projects. The church basement underwent a major renovation. Spurred on by a flood in the spring of 2011 that resulted in a \$20,000.00 insurance claim plus an additional \$10,000.00 from Leone's bequest, offices and the nursery were restored and a new Christian Education classroom and remodelled Parlour were designed and built with new walls and new flooring throughout. The main parking lot received a double application of tar and chip and plans are to expand the parking lot in the rear of the church to provide additional parking. To mitigate the threat of future flooding, a hydromatic sump pump that utilizes town water rather than electricity to drive the pump was installed and a back-up generator was purchased. Foundation deterioration at the back of the Christian Education Hall lead us to excavate the back wall, install new weeping tiles and add a layer of crushed rock for better drainage. Seven single-glazed windows in the church basement and the window on the stage have been replaced with vinyl double-glazed windows and we are in the midst of replacing all the exterior doors with new no maintenance steel doors. Finally, the original forced air gas furnace and electric hot water tank for the Christian Education Hall were replaced with high efficiency gas appliances. The benefit from many of these projects is to better sustain our church and lower our operating costs through reduced utility charges.

On a regular basis, grants are available from various levels of government on a cost sharing basis for community institutions that are open for public use. We are currently seeking a grant from the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario, Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund covering 33% funding for the church modernization projects we have completed this year. We have submitted four prioritized grant requests including the Flood and Foundation Deterioration Mitigation Project, the Parking Lot Improvement Project, Window and Exterior Door Replacement Project and the Furnace and Hot Water Tank Replacement Project for a total of \$14,375.40. A decision should be forthcoming early in the new year. In addition, we are seeking about \$600.00 or 50% funding for light bulb replacements through grants from Niagara-on-the-Lake Hydro and the Save on Energy Program. This will allow us to replace all remaining fluorescent tubes, incandescent and halogen lights with equivalent energy efficient bulbs that will in turn reduce our energy consumption and our hydro bills.

I'd like to thank all the current members of the Property Committee for their continued dedication to maintaining the church. The Property Committee is seeking new members who are handy and have an interest in the maintenance of our church.

We have also had high school students volunteer for their required volunteer hours, but more consistency in regular attendance would be appreciated and will be discussed with them in the future.

We had an excellent Vacation Bible School this summer. Although the numbers were a bit down from last year, due to vacation times, we look forward to next year. Thank you to the volunteers who helped make it all work so well.

Stephanie also planned some 'socials' for the children at her home and she took them out to Pizza Hut for supper. A 'bowling evening' has been promised. This social time builds a sense of church community for the children too, and we thank Stephanie. We like to remind everyone that on 'games night' for the adults, there is also 'games night' for the children so that families can come to supper and games together. We will publicise this more for our next 'games night'.

For future plans, Stephanie has suggested a 'progressive supper' evening so that the children can get to know some of the congregational members better and picture them in their own homes. We would need three participants to host part of the supper (a very casual, child-friendly supper!). If you are interested in participating in this, please contact Stephanie for more information. #### St. David's - Queenston UCW

The United Church Women (UCW) meet at the church on the second Wednesday of every month, except in July and August, and in June when we go out for lunch and in December we have a pot-luck to which, last year, the congregation was invited.

This year in celebration of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the UCW we held a service in June "Tapestry of Love." For this occasion, one of our members wrote a song: "United Church Women," which was approved by Hamilton Conference UCW and used by other groups.

As part of this celebration, nine women from the church, attended a drama and English tea in Niagara Falls. At the annual Niagara Presbyterial meeting, six of our Chartered members received a pin. Another part of the celebration is a special project to raise money for the Morogoro Women's Training Centre in Tanzania. So far the amount raised by all UCW (including us) is \$161,722.34 which will provide for eight fully funded maternal healthy care training.

Meat pies are made and sold on the last Friday of most months, which is a big project in which several women are very involved.

This year we donated \$5,000 to the General Fund, to cover the cost of insurance. Although insurance was less this year our donation remained \$5,000

We annually participate in "World Day of Prayer, held in a different church each year. Our annual Bazaar will be held on November 3<sup>rd</sup>.

It would be great to have more women joining us. We meet for tea and a snack at 1:30pm, begin our meeting at 2:00 and are usually finished by 3:00pm.

#### The Friendly Visitors Group

The Friendly Visitors Group consists of about nine to ten members of our church who visit either by phone or in person those who are unable to come out to church, are hospitalized or recently bereaved. The group meets only once a year and contact between the group is carried out on an informal basis at other times.

#### Session

Session consists of eleven elders, who meet on a regular basis with Rev. Paul James. We are not a working committee but oversee the spiritual interests of the congregation.

Session has a Memorial Fund and a Benevolent Fund. The majority of money donated to the Memorial Fund in 2010, 2011, and early 2012, was given toward the cost of the elevator and chair lift. The Benevolent Fund has a small amount of money in it, which is available to anyone in need who would qualify. Funds collected from the sale of name tags were donated to the Mission and Service Fund.

Our Anniversary Service with Rev. Pritchard as our guest speaker and the luncheon which followed, was a great success. Our Lenten and Easter Services were well attended. Communion has been served three times so far this year and we approved one Baptism so far this year.

We held the Dedication of the renovations of the basement: Sunday School room, nursery and parlour - in memory of Leone Ostrosser: a long-time member of this congregation. We have welcomed many new members into our congregation this year. We are so pleased to have them.

In the spring, all United Churches were asked to study the "Word of Faith," a booklet on the doctrine of the United Church. The intention was to broaden the Statement of Faith, by adding to the original doctrine from the Basis of Union in 1925. We were asked to discuss and vote on three issues:

- 1) a change in the Statement of Faith
- 2) a change in the New Creed
- 3) adding a "song of faith.

We did the study and our unanimous vote was not to approve #1. We did however approve #2 and #3. The Session's discussion was then taken to the Official Board. The final result was that the majority of United Churches approved all 3 changes.

The next few months will be busy with the Christmas season approaching. We emphasize the FOOD DRIVES during Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas, but we do accept food donations all year. Project Share will pick full barrels from the Narthex.

#### Mission and Service

The M. & S. envelope offering at the end of September was \$10,646. This amount was \$2,559 above that of the same time last year. If we continue with our givings, we'll be well over our goal of \$10,000, as we have been in the past few years. M. & S. outreach is a very important part of our church and our congregation is to be commended for its splendid response. "Toonie Sunday" collections have benefited

#### St. Davids-Queenston United Church Green Audit

Greening Sacred Spaces is a practical program developed by Faith & the Common Good to assist faith communities in taking actions to create a more sustainable and energy efficient place of worship and to educate members of the community about ecological issues. It also provides an opportunity to save money, help save the planet, and engage in meaningful conversations about the spirituality of eco-sustainability. Under the program, the United Church of Canada would fund a Green Audit of our church in exchange for us committing a minimum of \$750.00 in retrofits recommended in the resulting audit report. As the St. Davids-Queenston United Church Board had already approved a number of infrastructure projects that have an eco-sustainability component this became a no-cost item for our church. This was a great opportunity for us to assess our day to day operations and whether there were ways to reduce our environmental footprint, improve our environmental sustainability and even lower our operating costs. The resulting 34-page Green Audit Report was detailed and extensive and is available upon request. Here is a recap of their executive summary and recommendations:

"St. Davids-Queenston United Church is a 6,300 sq. ft. space located in St. Davids, Ontario. The Church Sanctuary was built over the years of 1946-1955, followed by a large addition, called the Christian Education Hall in 1964. The addition has 1 level, which includes a gym and a kitchen, while the original structure has 2 levels with the Sanctuary, children and youth areas, washrooms and various meeting/gathering rooms in the basement. The exterior of the building is constructed primarily of cement and brick, while the interior is either cement block or dry wall.

Electricity, natural gas (NG) and water are the Church's three utilities. Combined, utility expenditures for the year 2011 were \$5,742.69 and for this period the Church's energy consumption contributed approximately 20.68 tonnes of carbon dioxide to the atmosphere and consumed 17.66 kWh per sq. ft. This is just below our calculated average of 19.34 kWh per sq. ft.

Overall, we feel that the Church is in good operating condition as a result of the care and foresight taken in the day to day operations of the building, yet still has an excellent opportunity to reduce electricity, NG and water consumption"

There were many good recommendations in the report. Some are very low cost while others will take planning and funding. I would like to invite anyone in the congregation with a like-minded desire to worship in an eco-sustainable facility and who believe that Earth is a sacred gift to form a **Green Team**. The Green Team would be responsible for breaking the Green Audit Report into manageable portions then bringing other recommendations to the Board for consideration. This is also a great way to get together for fellowship and good discussions on a subject you have a passion for. Please see Steve Hardaker if you have an interest in this.
